Directors' Report

The Directors of Cromwell Funds Management Limited (CFM) the responsible entity of Cromwell Phoenix Opportunities Fund (the Fund), present their report at the end of the half-year ended 31 December 2022.

The responsible entity and its Directors

Cromwell Funds Management Limited has been responsible entity of the Fund since its registration. Cromwell Funds Management Limited is part of Cromwell Property Group, a global real estate investment manager with \$12.0 billion of assets under management. The responsible entity undertakes management and administrative duties for the Fund and monitors the Custodian, Link Fund Solutions Pty Limited, which holds the Fund's assets on behalf of the unitholders.

Review of operations and results

Financial performance

The Fund recorded a statutory profit of \$2,082,000 for the half-year ended 31 December 2022 (2021: \$6,778,000) and declared distributions of \$5,097,000 (2021: \$2,060,000).

The Cromwell Phoenix Opportunities Fund returned 6.7% (post fees including franking credits) for the half year ending 31 December 2022.

Fund performance was positively impacted by holdings in the energy service sector. In December, MMA Offshore (MRM) announced a trading update indicating that earnings before interest taxes depreciation and amortisation (EBITDA) for the first half of the 2023 financial year were anticipated to be in the range of \$30-32 million, up approximately 70% on the result achieved in the second half of the 2022 financial year. MRM gained 70.5% over the period.

Holdings in Ariadne Australia, Star Entertainment Group (SGR) and SkyCity Entertainment (SKC) detracted from portfolio performance over the half. Further details emerged during the period that the casino industry has fallen well short of legal and community expectations, with Star Entertainment Group found to be unsuitable to hold a casino license by regulatory bodies in both Queensland and New South Wales. The reviews recommended a variety of changes to future operations including time-based restrictions for players and requiring mandatory carded play. Compounding the issues facing SGR, on 17 December 2022, the NSW Government announced that it intended to increase duty rates applied to casinos. Both SGR and SKC performed poorly over the period falling 45% and 14.7% respectively. The fund exited a position held in SGR and reduced holdings in SKC during the half year.

Likely results and expected results of operations

The activities of the Fund are regulated by the Fund's constitution. Owing to the limitations on the scope of activities contained in the constitution, future activities of the Fund will be predominately confined to investments in ASX listed small capitalisation securities to provide a mixture of income and capital growth to investors.

The results of the Fund's operations will be affected by a number of factors, including the performance of investment markets in which the Fund invests and other global economic impacts (such as global geopolitical instability and tightened monetary policy). Investment performance is not guaranteed and future returns may differ from past returns. As investment conditions change over time, past returns should not be used to predict future returns.

Directors' Report

Value of scheme assets

The total carrying value of the Fund's assets as at the end of the reporting period was \$45,353,000 (30 June 2022: \$46,283,000). The Fund held investments valued at \$42,054,000 (30 June 2022: \$44,370,000) and net assets attributable to unitholders of \$44,417,000 (30 June 2022: \$43,862,000) at balance date. This represents net tangible assets of \$2.18 (30 June 2022: \$2.34) per unit, before any allowance for selling costs.

1. Basis of preparation

The half-year financial report of Cromwell Phoenix Opportunities Fund (the Fund) for the half-year reporting period ended 31 December 2022 is a general purpose financial report that has been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standard AASB 134 Interim Financial Reporting and the Corporations Act 2001 (Cth). The financial report is designed to provide an update on the Fund's financial performance and financial position since the last annual financial report was issued. This financial report therefore does not include all the notes normally included in an annual financial report and needs to be read in conjunction with the annual financial report for the year ended 30 June 2022. The Fund is a for-profit entity for the purposes of preparing financial statements.

The accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the half-year financial report are consistent with those adopted and disclosed in the Fund's annual financial report for the year ended 30 June 2022. These accounting policies are consistent with applicable Australian accounting standards and with international financial reporting standards.

The balance sheet is presented on a liquidity basis. Assets and liabilities are presented in decreasing order of liquidity and do not distinguish between current and non-current. All balances are expected to be recovered or settled within twelve months, except for financial assets at fair value through profit or loss and net assets attributable to unitholders.

The Fund manages financial assets at fair value through profit or loss based on the economic circumstances at any given point in time, as well as to meet any liquidity requirements. As such, it is expected that a portion of the portfolio will be realised within 12 months, however, an estimate of that amount cannot be determined as at balance date.

In the case of net assets attributable to unit holders, the units are redeemable on demand at the unit holder's option. However, holders of these instruments typically retain them for the medium to long term. As such, the amount expected to be settled within twelve months cannot be reliably determined.

The financial report has been prepared on a going concern basis.

Rounding of amounts

In accordance with ASIC Corporations (Rounding in Financial/Directors' Reports) Instrument 2016/191 amounts in these financial statements have been rounded off to the nearest thousand dollars, or in certain cases to the nearest dollar.

Comparatives

Where necessary, comparative figures have been adjusted to conform to changes in presentation in the current half-year.

Segment information

The Fund operates in one operating segment, being investment in ASX listed small capitalisation securities and unlisted equity securities. The Fund earns dividends and derives capital appreciation from investments in ASX listed and unlisted equity securities.

a) Critical accounting estimates and judgements

The preparation of financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of accounting policies and the reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expenses. Estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis and are based on historical or professional experience and other factors such as expectations about future events. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised and in any future periods affected.

At 31 December 2022 and 30 June 2022 the only assets carried at fair value are investments at fair value through profit or loss. Refer note 3 and note 5 for further information.

b) New and amended accounting standards and interpretations adopted by the Fund

The Fund has adopted all applicable new Australian accounting standards and interpretations. There are no new relevant accounting standards and interpretations that have been adopted in the current period.

There are currently no relevant accounting standards and interpretations that have been issued or amended but are not yet effective and have not been adopted by the Fund.

For the half-year ended 31 December 2022

Distributions

a) Overview

Distributions to unitholders are paid quarterly. When calculating the amount of a quarterly distribution, all income, after fees, expect for capital gains are distributed. Net capital gains are distributed at least once a year.

Investments at fair value through profit or loss

For accounting purposes, the fund's investments in listed and unlisted securities are classified as investments at fair value through profit or loss with fair value gains or losses recognised in profit or loss. For further details about the fair value measurement of these financial assets refer to note 5.

c) Distributions and dividend income

Dividend and distribution income from investments at fair value through profit or loss is recognised in the statement of profit or loss within distributions and dividend income when the Fund's right to receive payments is established. During the period the Fund recognised distributions and dividend income of \$5,104,000 (2021: \$1,532,000) from its investments at fair value through profit or loss.

4. Contributed equity

a) Overview

The Fund commenced in December 2011 as a wholly owned fund of the Cromwell Property Group. It commenced accepting unit applications from external investors in December 2014. From 26 January 2018 the Fund no longer accepts applications. However, existing investors can redeem units and may reinvest distributions.

Units are issued and redeemed by the Fund at a unit price determined daily in accordance with the responsible entity's Unit Pricing Policy. Per the Australian Securities and Investments Commission ("ASIC") and the Australian Prudential Regulation Authority's ("APRA") Unit Pricing: Guide to Good Practice, investors will receive compensation for any material unit pricing errors. In accordance with these guidelines the Fund does not pay exited members compensation for material unit pricing errors where the amount of any compensation payable is less than \$20.

5. Fair value disclosures – financial instruments

a) Fair value measurement of financial instruments

The Fund uses a number of methods to determine the fair value of its financial assets and financial liabilities. The methods comprise the following:

Level 1:	quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities.
Level 2:	inputs other than quoted prices included within Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly (as prices) or indirectly (derived from prices).
Level 3:	inputs for the asset or liability that are not based on observable market data (unobservable inputs).

The Fund measures and recognises the following financial instruments at fair value on a recurring basis as either Level 1 (quoted market prices) or Level 2 (inputs other than quoted prices). There are no level 3 investments.

- Listed equity investments at Level 1, where quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets; and
- Unlisted equity securities at Level 2, where inputs other than quoted prices included within level 1 that are observable for the asset, either directly (that is, as prices) or indirectly (that is, derived from prices).

Valuation techniques used to derive Level 1 fair values

The fair value of financial assets traded in active markets is based on their quoted market prices at the end of the reporting period without any deduction for estimated future selling costs.

The measurement of the fair value of the Fund's investments in listed equity securities is a Level 1 measurement. The Fund's Listed equity investments are ASX listed securities with the fair value being determined by reference to the quoted ASX closing price.

Valuation techniques used to derive Level 2 fair values

The fair value of financial instruments that are not traded in an active market is determined using valuation techniques. These valuation techniques maximise the use of observable market data, and rely as little as possible on entity specific estimates. If all significant inputs required to fair value an instrument are observable, the instrument is included in Level 2.

The measurement of the fair value of the Fund's investments in unlisted equity securities is a Level 2 measurement. These investments are comprised of holdings in a delisted ASX company. The fair value of these financial assets is based upon the net tangible assets as publicly reported by the underlying unlisted entity, adjusted for inherent risk where appropriate.

b) Fair values of other financial instruments not measured at fair value

The carrying amounts of receivables, payables and distributions payable are assumed to approximate their fair values due to their short-term nature.
